From its humble roots in 1990 through championships in many different leagues and tournaments to its current status as a perennial power in both the Interstate Athletic Conference (IAC) and the Mid-Atlantic Prep Hockey League (MAPHL), Prep hockey has been guided by visionaries and accomplished leaders that coached, managed, and led the boys who grew up and persevered with the program.

Prep hockey would like to offer thanks to the six former Varsity head coaches of the team: Kyran Kennedy, Kevin Charles, Brian Maloney, Sean O'Leary, Paul Fritz, and Greg Marinari. We also thank all the former assistant coaches who contributed as well, among them: Phil O'Donoghue Sr., Tony Gray, JP Hyland, Rory Hyland, Paul McGonagle, Bill Slater, CJ Kemp, Joey Kemp, Pat Winter, Nick Bliss, and Peter Perrella. Lastly, it would have been impossible to create and sustain a viable hockey program without the continuous support and assistance of the Rev. Scott Pilarz, S.J., Athletic Director Dan Paro, Rev. William George, S.J., the administration of Georgetown Prep, the Boosters and student supporters, and the families of those who have donned the blue and gray for Georgetown Prep.

#### **The Early Years**

In 1989, Prep students John Connell, Joe McCormick, and Steve Radanovic approached School Counselor Rick Robinson and Kyran Kennedy, who was employed at the time in the Prep Development Office, about forming a hockey program. Kyran and Rick set about to lay the groundwork to develop the program, resulting in the first practice taking place on November 13, 1990 at 6:15 a.m. in the Wheaton Outdoor rink. The Hoyas took the ice for their first season, under the leadership of Coach Kennedy as a "club" team. At the time of Prep hockey's formation, there was no hockey division in the Interstate Athletic Conference (IAC). Instead, Prep played in the new Maryland Scholastic Hockey League (MSHL). There were only a handful of high school hockey teams in the area, and Prep played each team 2 times per season. Good Counsel was an early rival (keeping in mind that Landon did not ice a team until the 1992-1993 season). Games were played at the Cabin John and Wheaton Outdoor rinks.

On these early teams, only a few players had hockey experience or developed skating skills. Opposition teams tended to be really strong, or in developmental mode. For example, one season DeMatha had 3 different teams and Prep had only one team. At one point Churchill had some skilled juniors on their team and could dominate. But when Prep played Good Counsel or Gonzaga, games were generally competitive. Nevertheless, for the first two years of the program, the Hoyas did not win a game.

In the 1992-93 season, Georgetown Prep gave the hockey team "Varsity" status. The skating Hoyas won their first game on December 11, 1992, beating Mount St. Joseph's "white" team 7-5. The Hoyas won their second game during the 1993-1994 MSHL season, finishing with a 1-8 overall MSHL record. The team also participated



in Gonzaga's inaugural National Capital Hockey Tournament (the Purple Puck) in 1993. During that third season, Prep played a game in the outdoor rink at College Park and, for the first time on record, attracted a large Prep following.

During the 1994-1995 season, the Hoyas began to reap success. Prep finished 2-1 at the Purple Puck during this season, and finished 1-9 in the MSHL. Scott Bergson was selected as MSHL Second Team southern conference All-Star, becoming the first Prep player to receive such an honor. During the 1995-1996 season, Prep won a preseason tournament and finished December of the year with a 4-1 record, marking the best-ever start for the team to that point. Prep hockey finished close to .500 by the end of the season, its best-ever finish, and set the stage for continuing growth and success in the program. Coach Kennedy gave up the reins of the program at the end of the 1995 season.

#### The Next Step

In 1996, Kevin Charles (currently a teacher and hockey coach at Mater Dei School) was named Head Coach. Coach Charles continued to push the program forward and with the success of the program came new challenges. CJ Kemp became Prep's very first Washington Post All-Met selection in 1997-98, and he repeated again in the 1998-1999 season. In the 1999-2000 season, Prep joined the MSHL Tier I division, the top tier in the league. In 2000, Prep defeated area number-one ranked Churchill 5-4 and went on to lose to Archbishop Spalding in the quarter-finals of the Maryland State tournament. In the 2000 Purple Puck, the Hoyas beat Oakton and pummeled Bishop O'Connell in the Purple Puck semi-finals, but were defeated by Gonzaga in the finals. Peter Bondra of the Washington Capitals presented the Finalist trophy to Prep. Prep was ranked no. 4 in Maryland at the end of the 2000-2001 season, Coach Charles' last.

#### **Growth and Prominence**

In 2001, Brian Maloney became Prep's third Varsity Head Coach. The 2001-2002 season marked the advent of hockey in the IAC and also the first-ever winning season for Prep hockey. At the time, there was no IAC tournament. Rather, the IAC championship was solely based upon won-lost record vs. other teams. The Landon game took place late in the season and was considered by many to be the de facto "championship." Prep defeated Landon in that game by a score of 4-1, establishing the prominence era of Prep hockey. In the Purple Puck, Prep beat Landon in the first round for the first time in tournament history by a score of 2-1. After defeating St. Albans in the semi-finals, Prep lost its rematch with Landon in a barnburner in the championship game. In the MSHL playoffs Prep lost 6-5 to St. Mary's in the quarterfinals. Prep finished ranked third in Maryland in 2001-02 behind DeMatha and Mt. St. Joe's. Phil O'Donoghue, Jr. was selected as Second Team All-Met, and Brian Boland was selected as Honorable Mention All-Met. The Hoyas finished the season with a 13-5 record.

In the 2002-2003 season, Prep won its first Purple Puck championship, defeating Gonzaga 4-3 in overtime. After beating Landon 3-2 earlier in the season, Prep lost to the Bears in the de facto IAC championship game, 8-2. Prep defeated Gonzaga 2-0 in the MSHL quarterfinals, but fell to Mount St. Joseph, 4-1, in the semi-finals. Kyle Keller was the first player to be named First Team All-Met for the Hoyas. Nikita Kashirsky was named to the second team All-Met, and Trevor Casey was given Honorable Mention. The Hoyas finished the 2002-2003 season with a 16-4-1 record.

In 2003-2004, Prep lost to Langley 3-2 in the Purple Puck championship game. In the MSHL playoffs, Prep defeated Bishop O'Connell in an exciting shootout, by a 2-1 score, but fell in the quarterfinals to Mount St. Joseph's, 5-3. Nikita















Kashirsky was named First Team All-Met, and Captain Joey Kemp was given Honorable Mention. The team finished with a 12-7-2 record.

The 2004-2005 Hoyas returned to the Purple Puck semi-finals before losing to Gonzaga, 4-0. Prep finished second in the IAC, with wins over Landon 3-1 and IAC champion Bullis 1-0. But the Hoyas then fell in the quarterfinals of the MSHL

playoffs to Bullis, 4-2. Senior Captain Peter Black made Second Team All-Met, and goalie Jason Maggio earned Honorable Mention. The team finished the season 11-5-5.

In 2005-2006, the Hoyas skated to the Purple Puck finals before losing 3-2 to O'Connell in triple overtime. Prep finished second during the IAC regular season, but won the inaugural IAC tournament defeating the

Landon Bears 3-2. The Hoyas and the Bears were named co-champions for the season. The Hoyas lost to the DeMatha Stags, 5-2, in the MSHL quarterfinals (having beaten them for the first time earlier in the season). Jason Maggio was the first Hoyas' goalie to be named to the Washington Post's First Team All-Met squad. Junior Nick Petersen earned All-Met Honorable Mention honors. The team went 16-6.


The 2006-2007 Hoyas were defeated by Bishop O'Connell 4-3 in the Purple Puck championship game. Prep returned to the IAC tournament finals but lost to Bullis, 3-0. Prep finished second in the IAC regular season and boasted two wins over archrival Landon by 6-1 and 4-1 margins. Nick Petersen was named First Team All-Met, and goaltender Corey Walwaski was recognized as All-Met Honorable Mention. The team was

defeated in the MSHL quarterfinals by powerhouse Mount St. Joseph, 6-3. The team went 16-7-1 in Coach Maloney's final season as Head Coach.

#### Stability and Success

Sean O'Leary became Prep's fourth Varsity Head Coach in the 2007-2008 season. Coach O'Leary played NCAA hockey at Assumption and was a member of the Prep Varsity coaching staff prior to becoming Head Coach. He took over a program that had become a perennial contender in the IAC, MAPHL, and the Purple Puck, and was consistently ranked in the Washington Post's top ten teams in the metro DC area.

Prep had a 12-1 record in 2007-2008, losing to Bullis in the IAC tournament semi-finals game. The Hoyas brought home the Purple Puck Championship Banner for Prep, defeating Bishop O'Connell 4-1. Corey Walwaski was an Honorable Mention All-Met selection, and CJ Sweigart and Justin Butler were All-IAC selections.



















The 2008-2009 Hoyas season's record was 14-6-1. The team was consistently ranked by the Washington Post among the top five teams in the area throughout the season. The team was named regular season IAC Champion but lost 5-4 to Landon in the IAC tournament championship game. Prep and Landon were named IAC Co-Champions. The Hoyas were seeded 4th in the new MAPHL and were downed by Gonzaga in a shootout in the quarter-finals. Three Hoya players achieved All-IAC honors: Justin Butler, Devin Drewyer,

and CJ Sweigart. Butler and Sweigart also were named to the All-MAPHL team.

The 2009-2010 Prep Hockey team completed their best-ever season to that point, finishing with a combined pre-season and season total record of 19-4-3. The Hoyas captured the IAC tournament championship, with a come-from-behind overtime victory over Landon, 4-3, and became IAC co-champions. The team ranked as high as no. 2 in the metro area by the Washington Post and finished the season as a semi-finalist in MAPHL. Justin Butler was named to the All-IAC, All-MAPHL teams, was named MAPHL Co-Player of the Year and was named First Team All-Met by the

Washington Post. Devin Drewyer was named to the All-IAC team and Second-Team All-Met. Davey Chadwick also was named to the All-IAC and All-MAPHL teams. PJ McNamara was named to the All-MAPHL team and received All-Met Honorable Mention. Pat Hall, Taylor Morgan, and AJ Taylor also were named Honorable Mention All-Met.

The defending IAC co-champions had something to prove in the 2010-2011 season, as they found themselves in an IAC that may have been the strongest-ever across the board. The team finished with an overall record of 16-6, finished as IAC finalists, MAPHL semi-finalists, and Purple Puck finalists. Prep hockey finished third overall in both The Washington Post and MAPHL rankings. Justin Butler earned First Team All-MAPHL, First Team All-Met, and first team All-Gazette honors, as well as his fourth straight All-IAC selection, and was selected as the All-MAPHL Player of the Year. Goalie PJ McNamara had an outstanding season, earning All Met Honorable Mention and All-Gazette Honorable Mention, Davey Chadwick was selected All-Met Honorable Mention, First Team All-Gazette, and All-IAC for his efforts. His younger brother Kyle Chadwick was named All-IAC and All-Gazette.

The Hoyas faced a difficult 2011-2012, having graduated five talented seniors. The team















responded, however, posting a 16-5 record and finishing the season ranked number 3 in the State of Maryland. Coach O'Leary was selected as the MAPHL Coach of the Year in his last season as the Hoyas' Head Coach. PJ McNamara was selected as the Washington Post All-Metropolitan Player of the Year, First Team All-Met goalie, All-IAC, All-Gazette, and as the Washington Capitals Player of the Month for January 2012. Senior Captain Mike McDonald was selected All-Gazette and Honorable Mention All-Met. Senior Assistant Captain AJ Taylor was selected First Team All MAPHL, First Team All-Gazette, Second Team All-Met, and All-IAC. Speedy junior center Kyle Chadwick was selected First Team All-MAPHL, All-IAC, All-Met Honorable Mention, and Second Team All-Gazette. Towering sophomore defenseman Lazar Zamurovic was selected as Honorable Mention All-Gazette.

#### The Crossover

Paul Fritz became Prep's fifth Varsity Head Coach in August 2012. A Maryland native, Paul played high school hockey locally at Archbishop Spalding before transferring to the Canterbury School, a private, Catholic preparatory school in New Milford Connecticut, where he played on the Varsity hockey team. During his senior year at Canterbury, he was offered multiple Division 1

NCAA hockey scholarships, however, he sustained an injury that prevented him from playing college hockey. Ultimately, he found his passion as a hockey coach and mentor at Team Maryland and Navy Youth hockey programs, prior to becoming Prep's Varsity Head Coach.

Graduation attrition from the previous year took away one of Prep's best defenseman, its second



leading scorer, and an All-Met Washington Post Player of the Year goaltender for the 2012-2013 season. Still, the Hoyas had plenty of talent, including returning first team All-MAPHL Center and team captain Kyle Chadwick, All Gazette defenseman Lazar Zamurovic, experienced defender Jeff Plamondon, and talented forwards Jack Olson, Cole Taylor, and Ryan Howe. In net, the Hoyas would rely on experienced sophomore backstop, Barry Leese and senior Jack Ring. Prep's hard work earned them another trip to the IAC playoffs, where they lost to arch-rival Landon in the semi-finals. Prep again fell to Landon in the MAPHL quarter-final game. Junior Lazar Zamurovic and sophomore Jack Olson were both named to the All-IAC team.

Coach Fritz began his second season at Prep with one of the youngest squads in recent memory. Coach Fritz and Assistant Coach Nick Bliss expected to rely on four outstanding seniors















(Captain Cole Taylor, Assistant Captain Lazar Zamurovic, Assistant Captain Ryan Howe and Assistant Captain Matt Billings) and three returning juniors (Jack Olson, Ryan Holman and Barry Leese). They also looked for contributions from sophomores Jake Neeb, who had a breakout year, Michael Melch and Blaine Green. But the future of the program ultimately would rest on the large class of Varsity freshmen: John Mac Mulera, MacDowell Johnston, and Max Newnam. The Hoyas posted an impressive 7-5-1 record, concluding the season with a 4-2-1 run. Cole Taylor and Lazar Zamurovic were named to the Washington Post's All-Met team and were named All-IAC. Cole Taylor and Jack Olson were named to the All-Gazette First Team. Zamurovic was also named Second Team All-MAPHL and Second Team All-Gazette. Ryan Holman was also named Second Team All-Gazette. John Mac Mulera was named All-Gazette Honorable Mention.

#### 2014-2015 Post-Season Summary

The 2014-2015 season would mark Coach Fritz's final season as Prep Head Coach. Hopes for the season were high with seven returning seniors (Captain Jack Olson, Assistant Captain Ryan Holman, Assistant Captain Joey Altemus, Riley Backenstoe, Jin Kin and goalies Barry Leese and Dillon Nobel), complemented by five returning juniors (Blaine Green, Jake Neeb, Micheal Melch, Micheal Magnarelli, and David Stanislav) and two returning Sophomores (MacDowell Johnston and Max Newnam). This backbone was complemented by Sophomores Ben Holman and Thomas Olson, Freshman Daniel Cole and goalie William Boggs. The year started with immediate adversity as the team lost both of its upper-class goalies, seniors Barry Leese and Dillon Nobel, but turned to rely on freshman Boggs in the crease. Despite early challenges, the team got off to a good start and was ranked as high as number 4 in the area after soundly defeating the #1 ranked team in the area, Bishop O'Connell, in December. Unfortunately,

injuries plagued the team through the spring and the Hovas finished the season 9-8-2. The team contended for the IAC regular season championship, but lost in a barnburner to arch-rival Landon at the end of the season. The team made both the IAC and MAPHL playoffs but was eliminated in the first round of each. Sophomore John Mac Mulera was the top scorer in MAHPL with 16 goals, 17 assists and 33 points. Mulera was named First Team All-MAHPL, All-IAC, First Team All-Gazette, and Second Team All-Met by the Washington Post. Senior Jack Olson was the third leading scorer in MAHPL with 12 goals, 16 assists and 28 points. Olson was named All-IAC, Second Team All-MAPHL, Second Team All-Gazette, and Honorable Mention All-Met by the Washington Post. Sophomore Junior Blaine Green was named Second Team All-Gazette and Honorable Mention All-Met by the Washington Post. Max Newnam was named Honorable Mention All-Gazette.

#### 2015-2016 Post-Season Summary

New Head Coach Gregg Marinari, Assistant Coach Peter Perrella, and nine returning Varsity players joined forces with seven new team members to form the squad for the 2015-2016 campaign. Led by senior Captain Blaine Greene (D) and senior Assistant Captains Michael Magnarelli (D) and Michael Melch (F), the Hoyas fought hard in what might best be characterized as a rebuilding year following the loss of ten Varsity players. Returning juniors Ben Holman (F), MacDowell Johnston (D), Thomas Olson (F), and Alex Ratliff (F) and returning sophomores William Boggs (G) and Daniel Cole (F) joined the Captains in welcoming sophomores Rollin Bell (G), Michael Davidson (F), Michael Curran (F), and Nathanial DeLeede (D), and freshmen James Flannery (F), Clay Lanham (F) and Rocco Nascone (F) to the team. Blaine Green, Michael Magnarelli, and MacDowell Johnston led the team on defense. On offense, Michael Melch, Ben Holman, Alex Ratliff, and Thomas Olson, as well as sophomore Daniel Cole, led the charge.















Sophomore backstop Will Boggs patrolled the crease and anchored the team. Key contributions were also made by the new Varsity additions.

The team encountered an up and down season, posting a final record of 9-12-3 overall, 2-3-0 in IAC league play and 6-6-2 in MAPHL league play. Fighting through numerous significant injuries, the team rebounded as the season closed to beat



St. Albans in the first round of the MAPHL playoffs - obtaining retribution for a loss to St. Albans in the first round of the IAC playoffs and an injury and penalty filled regular season tilt. The Hoyas fell, however, to perennial rival, 2016 IAC champion, and eventual MAPHL champion Landon in the MAPHL semifinal game.

Despite the challenging season, several Hoyas received post season recognition for their body of work. Senior Defenseman Blaine Greene and Junior Defenseman MacDowell Johnston were both named All-IAC. Greene was also awarded Honorable Mention All-Met, along with Sophomore Goalie William Boggs.

#### 2016-2017 Post-Season Summary

The 2016-2017 season was one for the record books for the Prep hockey program. With a completely new coaching staff and a strong and talented but young core of the team, the Hoyas were not the frontrunners going into the year, especially with a lineup initially filled with injuries. However, the Hoyas, led by fantastic coaches, including new

bench boss, Brian Danver, and assisted by coaches John, Duante Abercrombie, and Matt Reilly, took this underdog label in stride and went on to shock the league with a conference championship victory over Landon. After a seven game run which included the team's first victory in many years over Gonzaga in a 3-0 shutout, the team went on to win the first IAC championship, 2-0, over Landon in many years. The team fought hard to make the MAPHL playoffs and qualified, but fell to perennial rival Gonzaga in the semi-finals. The Hoyas finished the season with a strong record of 15-9-2 (7-5-1 in MAPHL and 2-1-1 in the IAC).

Captain MacDowell Johnston and Assistant Captains Ben Holman and Tom Olson led the team into battle each and every game and contributed a veteran presence that contributed to the team's playoff success. On offense, high scorer James Flannery had a breakout year, as did Daniel Cole with a key goal in a playoff game, complemented by hard-charging Alex Ratliff and Michael Davidson. On Defense, MacDowell Johnston, Clay Lanham, and Nathaniel De Leede led the charge. Goaltender Will Boggs anchored the team, and recorded key shutouts against Gonzaga and in both IAC playoff games. This core was bolstered by freshmen, such as Matt Scola, Alex Chaconas, Peter Roche and Nolan Urgo.

Several Hoyas earned post-season recognition. MacDowell Johnston was named Second Team All-MAPHL, Second Team All-Met by the Washington Post, and All-IAC; Tom Olson was named Honorable Mention All-Met by the Washington Post; Will Boggs was named All-IAC and Honorable Mention All-Met by the Washington Post; and James Flannery was named Second Team All-MAPHL and All-IAC. Many Hoyas also received MAPHL All-Academic First and Second Team honors. Congratulations to the Hoyas for all their hard work.

#### 2017-2018 Season Preview

Prep hockey returns this season with second year Head Coach, Brian Danver, at the helm, assisted by coaches John, Duante Abercrombie, and Mike McDonald. Captain Daniel Cole, alongside Assistant Captains Will Boggs, Michael Davidson and Clay Lanham, will lead the team. On the defensive side of the puck, the loss of All-IAC and former team Captain MacDowell Johnston will be tough to replace; however, the hard-hitting Clay Lanham appears to be the next man up on this young defense. Returning defenseman Nathaniel DeLeede and goalie Rollin Bell look to contribute senior leadership on the team. Prep's prolific offense looks to light the lamp at an even higher rate than they did last year. Leading scorer James Flannery is back alongside Daniel Cole as this dynamic duo looks to be one of the top lines in the league. This core will be assisted by a pack of veteran players, including Rocco and Marco Nascone, Ryan Gottshall, Brian Cho, Andres Permuy, Nick Leahy, and Kevin Christmas. They are also joined by a promising group of freshmen: Matt Prame, Connor McMahon, Billy Allston, Elijah Young, and Brendan Condron. This year the Hoyas look to defend their IAC title and make a run at the Mid-Atlantic Prep Hockey League Title, which would be the first in school history. Go Prep hockey!

Since 2003, the year my father passed, the Georgetown Prep alumni hockey game has been played in his honor. Kevin Charles, my former coach and good friend of my father's, presented my family with the idea of naming the game and an award after my father. Dad attended Landon from third grade until sophomore year, when he begged his parents to let him transfer to Georgetown Prep. His parents relented, and he couldn't have been happier. He loved the sense of community that Prep provided, and while he didn't come from a religious family, he cherished the prayers that were offered on one knee before sporting events. Dad graduated from Prep in 1975, and in 1999, my freshmen year, he found himself back in the Prep community. He was always very involved in my games, as well as in my younger brother's games at the youth level. He was active at all levels -- coaching, running the scoreboard, or just driving to the middle of nowhere at 5 a.m. on a weekend morning for our games. It was inevitable that he would become involved with the Prep ice hockey program. During my four years at Prep, my father was a fixture at the hockey games, as he was constantly working behind the scenes to make sure that the season ran smoothly. At the time, Prep hockey had only one team and had never had a winning season. Dad made it his dream to make the Prep hockey program a force in the Washington, DC area. It didn't take long. My sophomore year (the 2000-2001 season) we had Prep hockey's first-ever winning season, and my junior year we won the first-ever IAC hockey championship. Since my time there, the Prep hockey program has continued to grow and has transformed into the powerhouse hockey program that my father envisioned it to be. The annual alumni game was my father's little side project. He began organizing this game around 2000, collecting emails and hunting down past players. He organized a game over

Thanksgiving break, knowing that the college students would be home and that the alumni would gladly take on the current Prep team. I believe it was also an excuse for him to lace the skates up again and show me, and my teammates, how it's done. What started off as a small game of pickup in 2000, has become a hallowed tradition in the Prep hockey community.

Each year, the Wednesday night before Thanksgiving, former Prep hockey players file into Cabin John ice rink for a game with the current team. And every year as I am reunited with old friends, and introduced to new, I can't help but think of my father looking down, smiling, at this great tradition he helped start and viewing the flourishing Prep hockey program that he envisioned.

All alumni players are encouraged to participate in the Scott Smith Alumni Game. The participants have a great time competing and renewing friendships.
